## MENTORS wanted!

Our Middle School Mentoring and Support Program is in need of Mentors for the upcoming 2015-2016 school year. The goal of Alum Rock Counseling Center's Ocala Mentoring Program is to pair 60 at-risk middle school students who attend Ocala Middle School in East San Jose with mentors in order to improve their academic and future success by offering specialized one-on-one mentoring.

Mentors help their mentees seek out positive role models and provide them safe recreational activities. They help youth realize their full potential and influence them to make healthier choices that lead to physical, social and emotional wellness.

Our wonderful Volunteer Coordinator, Celina Chun helps match youth with mentors for the program as well as support mentoring relationships. Our mentoring program is unique in that we match mentors with mentees for a year-long commitment, which we expect at least 6 hours of mentoring to happen a month. You and

your mentee schedule time to talk or meet up; it is not a structured time that the program sets.

We are in dire need of mentors, and especially those who have come from similar backgrounds and communities as our students and families. This would be a great opportunity for those interested in giving back to the community, working in an educational mentoring setting, and in a district in which our students and families really deserve the resources to succeed, but are not always provided for them.

I'd like to recognize three of our staff who went above and beyond to represent ARCC in the community. The Intern Collaborative sponsors Andrew Hill High School juniors and seniors, in a week-long event where the county and community agencies spend time engaging the students and exposing them to the work done at each of the agencies.

The students who participate in this program have expressed an interest in working in the mental health field. Ava Pham and Rigo Rosas from our PEI program participated in a panel discussion. Akiko Chung, First Five Program Manager, helped in numerous ways in all of the activities.

Ava shared a heartfelt introduction with the students about her family's journey from Viet Nam, how they utilized public assistance to get by, and how her parents stressed to her and her siblings that pursuing education was the answer to success. She was inspiring and hopeful as she described how education was such a gift here in the U.S., because in Viet Nam one has to pay to attend school.

Rigo was just as inspiring as he talked about arriving in the U.S. at age 12, knowing no English, and being placed in ESL classes before he could be in the mainstream classes. He shared with the students how his parents - having a third grade education - raised him and his 2 brothers who have all graduated from college programs, and a third brother is enrolled in college now.

He talked about the need for services for Latino youth and families in our community, and told them of his commitment to service and the profession.

Shout out to Akiko, who as always was reliable and a great help, she arrived very early to help Jesse set up and greet the students and then participated with me in a role play and puppet making activity. She engaged with the students during lunch and stayed with me to help clean up. She devoted her day to help make this day a success and to help ARCC shine once again. Thank you Ava, Akiko, and Rigo for being wonderful, I really could not have made this day happen without your help!

## ARCC in the Community


